Anywhere in the world, this time of the year is highly celebrated for different reasons. Here are some notable events in July:

1. Gion Matsuri (Japan)

The Gion Matsuri is considered one of the largest and most famous festivals in Japan. Taking place throughout the entire month of July in Kyoto, this traditional event dates back to 869 AD. Originally, the festival was held to appease the gods during a deadly epidemic. At that time, during the Heian period, Kyoto was the imperial capital, and the emperor sent messengers to offer prayers at Yasaka Shrine to bring an end to the plague.

Every year, a young boy, known as the Chigo, is chosen to serve as a sacred messenger of the gods. He rides one of the elaborately decorated Yamaboko floats. He must not touch the ground or anyone outside his caretakers to preserve ritual purity.

The festival features parades, traditional dancing, street food stalls, and displays of Kyoto's cultural and artistic heritage, including byōbu (folding screens) and kimono.













2. Fourth of July (USA)

This holiday dates back to the 18th century, when the thirteen American colonies declared their independence from the British crown. The Declaration of Independence, the founding document of the United States, was officially adopted on July 4, 1776, marking the birth of American independence.

The Fourth of July is celebrated across the United States with fireworks, patriotic speeches, parades, concerts, and community gatherings like picnics and barbecues. Expressions of national pride are everywhere – people display the flag, and wear clothing inspired by the nation's colors: red, white, and blue.

3. Festival of San Fermin (Spain)

Every year, visitors from around the world travel to Pamplona, Spain to witness – or even experience – the adrenaline-pumping Running of the Bulls, known locally as the Encierro. From July 7 to July 14, bulls run around the town's narrow streets toward the bullring, while thrill-seekers - dressed in white clothing with red scarves or sashes - run alongside them, avoid being trampled.

This dramatic event is just one part of the weeklong San Fermín Festival, held in honor of Saint Fermin, the town's first bishop and patron saint. Among the many festivities is the Comparsa de Gigantes y Cabezudos, a colorful parade featuring giant puppets with oversized heads that dance through the streets.

The celebration ends in the plaza as crowds gather to sing "Pobre de mí" ("Poor TORDELLY Me"), bidding farewell to their beloved fiesta until the following year.









Other fun events in July:

- 1. International Joke Day (July 1)
- Share hearty laughs and kind humor. On this day, people have the best excuse to be silly. So tell your best (or worst) jokes!
- 2. Teddy Bears' Picnic Day (July 10)
- It's time to take your stuffed best friend to a picnic and reminisce about the good old days.
