Preparing for the EIKEN Speaking Test

- •Review past test questions to understand the format. This is important!
- •Practice **reading aloud** to improve pronunciation and rhythm.
- •Record yourself speaking and listen for mistakes.
- •Study common topics (school, family, daily life, news).
- •Practice giving reasons and examples after your answers.
- •Study **EIKEN word lists** and use **simple sentence patterns** for **opinions**.
- •Rehearse with an LC teacher, classmate, or online partner.
- •Time your practice so answers are not too short or too long.

When you are taking the Speaking Test

- •Listen carefully to the examiner's question before answering.
- •Use full sentences, not single words.
- •If you don't understand, politely ask, "Could you repeat that, please?"
- •Expand your answers with reasons or examples.
- •Use simple grammar correctly rather than difficult forms with mistakes.
- •Stay calm and smile; confidence makes a good impression.

An October Diary Challenge

Why don't you write a short diary in English every day in October? Writing a simple diary can help you to understand what you can say, and most importantly, what you don't know how to say in English. But, what is Halloween?

An October newsletter wouldn't be complete without talking about Halloween! Are you wearing a costume or having a Halloween party? What is this event, anyway?



Halloween is originally a festival from countries with a **Celtic** culture, such as **Ireland** and **Scotland**. It was called "Samhain" in these countries (pronounced SAH-wen). Samhain is the word used there for the 11th month, November, and it was once a festival on October 31st and November 1st, to celebrate the **harvest** and remember **ancestors**. It was not really a **spooky** festival in the past, but it has changed.

Halloween was **imported** to the USA by Irish and Scottish **settlers** wishing to make a new life in America. Over time, it grew and has been brought to many countries, including Japan. It is now more of a fun celebration of horror and all things **supernatural**.
